

Message Regarding Our 2023-2024 District Budget

Development of a budget spans several months beginning in early January each year. District officials are tasked with determining how resources will be allocated to achieve our educational goals. This involves assessing academic programming, the social and emotional needs of our students, Special Education needs, and transportation requirements.

The proposed 2023-2024 General Fund budget helps us reach our educational goals while remaining fiscally responsible to our taxpayers. This year's budget hearing will be on Wednesday, May 3, 2023, at 6:30 p.m. in the elementary auditorium. Scio CSD thanks you for your consideration of the 2023-2024 school budget.

Board Member Vacancies

Two (2) - Five (5) Year Terms
One (1) - Three (3) Year Term

To fill the expired term of office of Mrs. Melanie Ryan and Mr. Robert Thompson and the unexpired term of Mr. David Roberts

All vacancies are filled "at large". The two candidates with the greatest number of votes will be elected to the board for five-year terms; and the candidate with the next highest number of votes will be elected to the board for a three-year term.



Voting Qualifications

A resident of the Scio Central School District shall be entitled to vote who is:

1. a citizen of the United States;
2. at least 18 years of age by May 16, 2023;
3. a resident of the district for at least 30 days preceding the vote.

Absentee Ballot Qualifications

A resident of the Scio Central School District shall be entitled an absentee ballot who is:

1. a qualified voter of the district;
2. a patient in a hospital or unable to appear personally at the polling place on the day of the vote due to illness, or physical disability;
3. unable to appear because of duties, occupation, business or studies that require him/her to be outside the county or city of residence on the day of the vote;
4. incarceration other than for conviction of a felony.

Process to Obtain/Cast an Absentee Ballot

A qualified voter of the Scio Central School District voting by absentee ballot must:

1. Contact the school by phone or mail and request that an application be sent to them;
2. Complete the application and return it to the District; the District Clerk must receive this application at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.
3. Complete the ballot, fold it and enclose it in a special marked envelope, seal it, sign and date the oath;
4. Place the official ballot envelope in another envelope and mail it to the District Clerk. It must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.



Process to Obtain/Cast a Military Ballot

A qualified “Military voter” means a qualified voter of the state of New York who is in actual military service, as defined in paragraph (a) of this subdivision, and by reason of such military service is absent from his or her district on the day of election, OR a voter who is discharged from such military service within thirty days of an election AND the spouse, parent, child or dependent of such voter accompanying or being with him or her, if a qualified voter and a resident of the same school district. Education Law Section 2018-d (1)(b)

1. Contact the school by mail, e-mail, or fax to request that an application be sent to them;
2. A valid application must be received by the District Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 21, 2023.
3. Complete the ballot, fold it and enclose it in a special marked envelope, seal it, sign and date the oath;
4. Place the official ballot envelope in another envelope and mail it to the District Clerk. It must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.



On May 16, you will be voting on the following:

Proposition 1 - General Budget

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be authorized to expend the sum set forth in the proposed 2023-24 budget in the amount of \$11,574,928?

Proposition 2 - Purchase of One School Bus

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be authorized to purchase one 64-passenger diesel school bus, at a total purchase price not to exceed one hundred fifty-six thousand eight hundred seventy-three dollars (\$156,873), the balance to be financed by bonding over five (5) years, and to levy the necessary taxes?

Proposition 3 – Scio Memorial Library

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be permitted to increase the tax levy for the Scio Memorial Library from \$26,789 to \$36,168?

Election of Three (3) Candidates to the Board of Education

Vote for three (3):

Two (2) five (5)-year terms to expire 6/30/28

One (1) three (3) year term to expire 6/30/26

All vacancies are filled “at large”.

The candidates with the greatest number of votes will be elected to the board.

Three-Part Budget Summary

New York State law requires all school districts to present their budgets divided into three expenditure categories: program, administrative, and capital.

Includes: salaries and benefits of teachers, guidance counselor, aides, nurses, etc.; teaching supplies, equipment and textbooks; library and instructional computer funds; athletics; and transportation costs (except bus purchases).

Includes: salaries and benefits of administrators who spend most of their time performing supervisory duties; insurance costs; legal expenses; public

information; business office operations; and Board of Education expenses.

2022-23	\$ 1,249,211	11.14%
2023-24	\$ 1,240,861	10.72%

Includes: debt service on buildings; bus purchases; custodial costs including salaries and benefits of maintenance workers; and all facilities costs, including supplies, utilities, and repairs.






Proposed 2023-2024 Revenue Distribution




State Aid & Property Tax Levy as a % of the Budget
