
February was National Career and Technical Education Month. On Friday, February 28, the Belmont BOCES CTE Center held assemblies to celebrate students' achievements.

## Message Regarding Our 2025–2026 District Budget

Greetings from Jon Cucchiaro, the business administrator here at Scio. I invite you to attend the annual budget presentation on Wednesday, May 7th at 6:30 p.m. in the elementary auditorium. There will be three propositions that we're asking you to vote on. The first is to support students through our proposed budget and the second is the purchase of one school bus. The third is from the Scio Memorial Library for their budget request.

The increases in our budget this year are mainly in salaries for our professional and support staff. We believe investment in our staff is the key to providing an excellent education for our students. You may also notice an increase in the capital section of the budget. This increase is balanced by an increase in state aid, as the district receives a 97% aid rate on capital improvements.

Development of the budget occurs over several months beginning in early January. The administrative team has carefully considered how to best allocate limited resources to achieve our educational goals. This involves assessing academic and special education programming, the social and emotional needs of our students, and transportation requirements. We believe our budget reflects our commitment to students and the community.

The team and I appreciate your time and consideration of our 2025-2026 budget.

# **Voting and Early Mail Ballot Qualifications**

A resident of the Scio Central School District shall be entitled to vote who is:

- 1. a citizen of the United States;
- 2. at least 18 years of age by May 20, 2025;
- 3. a resident of the district for at least 30 days preceding the vote.

## **Absentee Ballot Qualifications**

A resident of the Scio Central School District shall be entitled an absentee ballot who is:

- 1. a qualified voter of the district;
- 2. a patient in a hospital or unable to appear personally at the polling place on the day of the vote due to illness, or physical disability;
- 3. unable to appear because of duties, occupation, business or studies that require him/ her to be outside the county or city of residence on the day of the vote;
- 4. incarceration other than for conviction of a felony.

### Process to Obtain/Cast an Absentee Ballot or Early Mail Ballot

A qualified voter of the Scio Central School District voting by absentee or early mail ballot must:

- 1. Contact the school by phone or mail and request that an application be sent to them;
- 2. Complete the application and return it to the District; the District Clerk must receive this application at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.
- 3. Complete the ballot, fold it and enclose it in a special marked envelope, seal it, sign and date the oath;
- 4. Place the official ballot envelope in another envelope and mail it to the District Clerk. It must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

## Process to Obtain/Cast a Military Ballot

A qualified "Military voter" means a qualified voter of the state of New York who is in actual military service, as defined in paragraph (a) of this subdivision, and by reason of such military service is absent from his or her district on the day of election, OR a voter who is discharged from such military service within thirty days of an election AND the spouse, parent, child or dependent of such voter accompanying or being with him or her, if a qualified voter and a resident of the same school district. Education Law Section 2018-d (1)(b)

- 1. Contact the school by mail, e-mail, or fax to request that an application be sent to them;
- 2. A valid application must be received by the District Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 21, 2025.
- Complete the ballot, fold it and enclose it in a special marked envelope, seal it, sign and date the oath;
- 4. Place the official ballot envelope in another envelope and mail it to the District Clerk. It must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.



## On May 20, you will be voting on the following:

#### **Proposition 1 - General Budget**

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be authorized to expend the sum set forth in the proposed 2025-26 budget in the amount of \$12,579,026?

#### **Proposition 2 - Purchase of One School Bus**

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be authorized to purchase one 66-passenger diesel school bus, at a total purchase price not to exceed one hundred seventy-five thousand six hundred dollars (\$175,600), the balance to be financed by bonding over five (5) years, and to levy the necessary taxes?

#### **Proposition 3 – Scio Memorial Library**

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be permitted to increase the tax levy for the Scio Memorial Library from \$41,593 to \$44,920?

#### Election of One (1) Candidate to the Board of Education

Vote for one (1): One (1) five (5)-year term to expire 6/30/30

All vacancies are filled "at large." The candidate with the greatest number of votes will be elected to the board.

## Three-Part Budget Summary

New York State law requires all school districts to present their budgets divided into three expenditure categories: program, administrative, and capital.

*Includes:* salaries and benefits of teachers, guidance counselor, aides, nurses, etc.; teaching supplies, equipment and textbooks; library and instructional computer funds; athletics; and transportation costs (except bus purchases).



## State Aid & Property Tax Levy as a Percentage of the Budget







## 5-Year Budget History

Scio's Spanish and Creative Writing classes went to El Sabroso in Bolivar. The Spanish class interacted with the wait staff in Spanish, ordering their meals in Spanish. The Creative Writing class was there to be a "food critic". Here's what they have to say:

#### Mexican Restaurant Review, Mayson Walsh

Let's start this off strong and fast. When I first walked in, I noticed something, it smelled amazing and I could smell cooked meat and other foods, along with an overall clean smell. When I ordered, the waitress was very patient, and kind and I thought that was very respectable of her, and I appreciated it very much. Once I muttered out what I wanted, it only took a few minutes to receive all our drinks. The drinks were amazing, and some people even got the special sodas that they sold called 'Jarrito's". Once we got our food, I was startled by how large my burrito was. It was beautiful, it was cheesy, it was meaty, it was full of peppers, and it looked like Heaven. Once I bit into it, that was when I fell in love with it. I ate everything in sight. It was some of the best food I've had in forever. One thing I forgot to mention was the appetizer (chips and salsa) was amazing. It was sweet, spicy, and a little tangy, and it was just awesome! Personally, the only downfall of this restaurant, in my opinion, was that the bathroom was out of commission, so nobody could use it if they had to use the restroom.

#### El Sabroso, Kilea A. Wenslow

Recently, the Foreign Language Club went to a Mexican restaurant in Bolivar; a place called El Sabroso. I am certain we all had an amazing experience there! We started off with chips and salsa. The salsa was exceptional, and the salt and cilantro ratio was perfect. We were all extremely glad that they kept coming back with more chips. The workers put the salsa in bright red and blue colored bowls which really added a splash of color to the atmosphere. The food was great, especially my main course, Enchiladas Suiza. These were an enchilada filled with queso, chicken and a Suiza sauce made with tomatillos, peppers, cream, and seasonings and/or herbs These had a perfect amount of spice and a yummy cheese topping. It also came with rice on the side which was heavenly. They had very cheery Mexican music on, and the restaurant itself was very colorful. *The service was amazing! Although they* 



did not have lime Jarroto's, which was almost detrimental on my part, overall, the restaurant was amazing, the service was great, the food was spectacular, and the drinks were very tasty.

#### El Sabroso, Anonymous

*On the 13th of February, the Creative* Writing class joined the Spanish class on a trip to El Sabroso in Bolivar. The restaurant was quiet, but the workers there were kind. *A few minutes after arriving, we received* our drinks as well as salsa and chips. The salsa was nice, with hints of cilantro, and just the right amount of salt. The chips were freshly baked, and they were quickly eaten by everyone. A second serving of chips was quickly delivered to the table. When it was time to order, there was a small language barrier, but things seemed to go smoothly. When the food was brought out was when a few issues arrived. Some people were having to trade plates, one person didn't receive what they ordered at all, there was miscommunication on side dish substitutions, and there was an extra dish that no one had ordered. Despite the few hiccups, it was still a good place to eat. Although the food was quite delicious overall, the steak was overdone, and they failed to replace the beans with rice on my order. Most enjoyed their food, and some even went out of their comfort zone and tried new foods. The place serves great food, and the Spanish rice is by far the best quality I've had in a while.

#### El Sabroso, Mought Toth

My experience at El Sabroso was pretty good! They came out with a strong first impression, greeting us at the door and seating us immediately, even though we were a large, and probably overwhelming group. While there was a bit of a language barrier between my peers and the waitress,

she handled the situation very well by being patient and understanding. Overall, the environment was great — good decor, kind staff, adequate lighting; besides the fact that the floors and ceiling tiles were a little dirty. In addition to the environment, the food was AMAZING! The appetizer corn chips were very crunchy and not overwhelming with spices and the salsa was just right. I ordered the ACP, which comes with chicken, veggies, and rice; I had absolutely no complaints. The vegetables were the right texture (not too soft, not too hard), and the seasoning on the chicken was phenomenal. The rice was a good color and absolutely no grains were hard — trust me, it was perfect. I ended up ordering a side of it to go. :) All in all, I had a great time, and I'm looking forward to my next visit!
