Soccer Team Wins Sectional Title

Congratulations to the Boys Varsity Soccer team for winning the Section V Class D2 Sectional Championship. As the number 1 seed in the Class D2 Sectionals, the team defeated Mt. Morris 3-1 in the quarter-finals, Prattsburgh 2-1 in the semi-finals and then Belfast 4-1 in the Championship game. The team (*shown ABOVE*) finished their season with a 17-3 record. This was the first time in 40 years that the boys team has won this title.

The team's captains along with Coach McFall accepted the #1 Seed plaque at the Section V Boys Soccer Banquet (*see photo AT RIGHT*). Coach McFall was also recognized at the banquet as Class D2 Coach of the Year. *The Scio Community is very proud* of the accomplishments of this year's team!

As a district, we are continually working to meet the needs of our students and families. Two recent additions are our Dental Program and Lego Robotics opportunity.

We realize that many families do not have dental insurance. One of our more recent additions is our collaboration with Olean General Hospital/Kaleida Health to provide dental care. Enrollment forms were handed out with first quarter report cards. Additional copies can be secured by contacting the main office. *With this program, dental care will be provided to your child at no cost to you.* If your child has dental insurance, the insurance company will be billed. If your child does not have dental insurance, grant funding will cover the cost of an exam, fluoride treatment and in some cases, sealants. If interested, please complete the form and return it to your child's teacher.

In November, our first Lego Robotics







team competed in a tournament at Houghton College. Mrs. Root and Mrs. Hardy coached our teams of fourth and fifth graders. As some of the youngest competitors at their first competition, they made us proud and represented our school well. As you may recall, we added a VEX Robotics class for seventh grade students last year, and this year, we have expanded it to eighth graders. These activities provide students with opportunities to stretch their problem solving, collaboration and coding skills. If you have a middle school child who is interested in STEM activities, watch for a flyer coming home soon about a Summer Steam & Innovation Camp being held in August in Cuba.

We had two successful Instant Decision days with JCC and Alfred State. And 100% of our seniors who applied were accepted into these colleges!

Mrs. Hardy will start meeting with underclassmen to begin scheduling for next year. Parents/guardians are invited to attend these appointments: either in person or by phone (whichever is most convenient for you). Be on the lookout for a notice regarding your student's assigned time.

Important Upcoming Dates

January 6 - Juniors will receive their ASVAB results and attend a presentation about how to interpret their results.

January 14 - Sophomores will attend a presentation about the programs offered at the Career and Technical Education Center at Belmont.

February 3 - This is the deadline for applying for scholarships through the Allegany County Area Foundation. Remember to give your recommenders sufficient time to be able to write letters of recommendation. Seniors, be sure to complete this process because there are a number of opportunities available to you!

February 7 - Sophomores will tour the Belmont CTE Center and visit three programs of their choice. The Center currently has 14 programs to choose from: Animal Science, Automotive Technology, Carpentry and Construction, Collision Repair, Cosmetology, Criminal Justice, Culinary Arts, Early Childhood, Media Communications, Medical Assisting, Natural Resources, New Visions – Health Professions, Pre-Engineering and CADD, and Welding.

Exam Strategies

Educationcorner.com recommends the following strategies when preparing for and taking an exam:

1. Be prepared. There is no substitute for preparation. If you haven't studied throughout the semester, if you haven't reviewed prior to test day, if you don't know the test material, all the test taking strategies in the world won't save you. Preparation is

key. Spend as many hours as necessary to understand the material to be covered on the test well enough to achieve a high score.

2. Always arrive early and take a moment to relax. You'll increase your confidence if you take time to relax. You'll be able to narrow your focus for the upcoming test.

3. Listen attentively to last minute instructions given by the instructor. If you miss test instructions, test taking anxiety will increase.

4. Do a memory dump. Doing so can be a particularly useful strategy for improving performance on certain types of tests. As soon as you begin the test, write down information that you will likely need to know for the test and you fear you may forget (ie., formulas, equations, dates, lists, etc.).

5. Read the test directions very care-fully and watch for details. Test questions and directions often contain valuable information. Always read all directions carefully to ensure you understand what is being asked. It is not uncommon to have two correct answers on a multiple choice question. Pay attention to details.

6. Plan how you will use the allotted time. Take a moment to estimate how much time you'll have for each section of the test and each question. Allow enough time for more difficult sections or sections that are weighted more heavily in the final test grade. Pace yourself so you can complete the test in the allotted time frame. Complete the questions you know first, then come back to the problems you're not sure about after. 7. Maintain a positive attitude. Do not lose confidence or waste time if you encounter confusing or difficult questions. Answer the questions you know first. If you have no clue about the correct answer, make an educated guess if it will not count against your score. Disregard patterns. It is probably coincidence if a string of multiple choice answers you know are correct are all "a."

8. Rely on your first impressions. The first answer that pops in your mind is usually the correct answer. Don't change answers unless you're sure the answer you've chosen is wrong. It may be counterproductive to review answers and make changes – especially if you're struggling to get through the test.

9. Plan to finish early and have time for review. Go back and answer difficult questions after answering easy ones. If you are required to complete an essay, review it for spelling and grammatical errors.

The Scio History Club successfully hosted dozens of local veterans on Thursday, November 7 kicking off the Veterans Day weekend. The Club honored local veterans and their guests. The visitors were treated to a wonderful choral performance by the fifth & sixth grade choir directed by SCS Vocal Music Teacher Amy Berardi (see photo at top left). The veterans and their guests also enjoyed a delicious dinner and dessert prepared by Mrs. Farwell, Mrs. Habberfield, and Mrs. Printup. Mr. Steven Appleby from the World War II Museum in Eldred, PA, served as guest speaker for the event. History Club members were also on hand to set up, clean up, and serve the food and drinks to the veterans and guests.

The next day, Club members took a field trip to the WWII Museum in Eldred, PA. Students were given a guided tour by Mr. Appleby, an retired Green Beret who leads the museum. The visitors spent several hours viewing artifacts from World War II and learning about the war. The students also learned about the heroism and sacrifice of millions of veterans.

Artifacts included a German motorcycle with a built-in MG42 in the sidecar, as well as many medals and pins given to soldiers from that era from both Axis and Allied troops. The museum also houses scaled models of various battles -- such as the storming of Omaha Beach on D-Day -- a multitude of WWII era uniforms from several regiments, and a vast collection of weapons used in the war.

While we were there, a WWII veteran came to the museum with his family. As we were leaving, every student and chaperone stopped to shake his hand and thank him for his service. It was awe inspiring. Overall, the trip was a very interesting and informative venture, and the rich history of the museum was very worthwhile to explore.

#### When to Keep a Child Home with Illness During Cold and Flu Season

Sometimes it can be difficult for a parent to decide whether to send children to school when they wake up with symptoms of an illness or complaints that they do not feel well. In general, during cold and flu season, unless your child is significantly ill, the best place for them is in school. Remind your children to discard used tissues promptly, not to share personal items, to cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze, to keep their hands away from their face, and to wash hands thoroughly and often with soap and warm water. However, there are some situations in which it is best to plan on keeping your child home for a day to rest or to arrange for an appointment with your health care provider.

The following are a few situations that warrant watching and possibly calling your health care provider:

- Persistent fever greater than 100.4° orally, including a fever that requires control with medication such as Tylenol
- Child is too sleepy or ill from an illness, like vomiting and/or diarrhea
- Cough that makes a child feel uncomfortable or disrupts the class
- Sore throat that is severe along with fever and feeling ill for more than 48 hours, OR after known exposure to a confirmed case of Strep throat infection

- Honey-crusted sores around the nose/mouth or rash on other body parts; OR a rash in various stages including boils, sores and bumps that may be chicken pox; OR a significant rash accompanied by other symptoms of illness (fever, etc.)
- Red, runny eyes that distract the child from learning
- Large amount of discolored nasal discharge, especially, if accompanied by facial pain or headache
- Severe ear pain or drainage from the ear
- Severe headache, especially if accompanied by fever
- Any condition you think may be serious or contagious.

If symptoms warrant your child to be treated by their doctor, be sure to ask the doctor when it's safe for your child to return to school and have them supply a note stating your child may return at a specified date.

Finally, if you know your child is still running a fever, it is not a good idea simply to give them Tylenol or Ibuprofen and send them to school because as soon as the medicine wears off, you are apt to get a call from the school nurse to leave work and come to pick up your feverish child. It is better to let them stay home in bed with a fever and take their medications at home until they are off all medicines and fever free for 24 hours. If you find a pattern of your child asking to stay home from school, especially if they are falling behind or appear anxious by the thought of attending school, or if there does not appear to be any obvious physical symptoms, it may be a good idea to contact your school nurse and your health care provider to discuss your concerns. Remember, whenever you keep your child home from school, please call the school nurse office at (585) 593-0886 in advance of the start of the school day and leave a message that your child will be absent and the illness he/ she is suffering.





#### ENCOURAGING GOOD ATTENDANCE: WHAT PARENTS CAN DO

Why should we focus on attendance?

#### Children can't learn if they aren't in school,

- √ Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause some children to fall behind in school.
- $\sqrt{}$  How many absences are too many? Chronic absence is defined as 18 days a year—or just 2 days a month.
- Missing 10 percent or about 18 days of the school year in kindergarten can lower achievement in 1st grade and, for some students, through 5th grade. Students can still fall behind if they keep missing just a day or two every few weeks.

#### As parents, we can influence attendance and poor attendance can be prevented.

- $\sqrt{}$  Parents especially in the early years are the best ones to make sure that children attend school and to build the expectation around attendance.
- $\sqrt{}$  Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- $\sqrt{}$  Monitor teen screen time at bedtime.
- $\sqrt{}$  Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- $\sqrt{}$  Don't let your child stay home unless they are truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of stress or anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- $\sqrt{}$  If your child seems stressed about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other school staff for advice on how to make them feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- $\sqrt{}\,$  Develop some backup plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor or another parent.
- $\sqrt{}\,$  As much as possible, try to avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.


